Silver Spotted Skipper	black locust, wisteria, legumes	<i>Epargyreus clarus</i>
Sleepy Orange	cassia	<i>Eurema nicippe</i>
Snout Butterfly	hackberry, sugarberry	<i>Libytheana bachmanii</i>
Southern Pearly Eye	giant cane, switch cane	<i>Enodia portlandia</i>
Spicebush Swallowtail	spice bush, sassafras	<i>Papilio troilus</i>
Spring Azure	flowering parts — dogwood, wild cherry, viburnum	<i>Celastrina ladon</i>
Summer Azure	wide variety of plants, mainly shrubby dogwoods	<i>Celastrina neglecta</i>
Tawny Emperor	sugarberry, hackberry	<i>Asterocampa clyton</i>
Tiger Swallowtail	tulip poplar, wild cherry, sweet bay, lilac	<i>Papilio glaucus</i>
Variagated Fritillary	violet, passionflower (maypop), pansies, plantain	<i>Euptoieta claudia</i>
Viceroy	willow, poplar, aspen, apple, cherry, plum, cottonwood	<i>Limenitis archippus</i>
Zebra Swallowtail	pawpaw	<i>Eurytides marcellus</i>
Zabulon Skipper	grasses	<i>Poanes zabulon</i>
